

William 2015 Book Review

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Overview

1. Grace Powers is a pen name. The author comes across as someone genuinely devoted to resisting the New World Order, and empowering spirituality. But in my opinion she also makes unnecessarily absolutist statements to support her theories, which generally shows unfounded research in certain areas. For example:

“There is no reason whatsoever to doubt the truth of the ancient Sumerian records which describe and illustrate human-like Gods genetically engineering the human race and living side by side with them.” P. 99.

“In the 1800’s, Sumerian clay tablets were found in present day Iraq. The tablets clearly reveal the name of the God who genetically engineered the human race. His name is Enki and he is the same serpent God that the Greeks called Poseidon. Why on earth would the Sumerians and other ancient civilizations who were geographically isolated from one another make up the same lies about our human origins? The real question that needs asking is why the corporate religions of the world have hidden the truth from us.” P. 5.

(See also, p. 10 referencing that Enki is Poseidon, and p. 98 stating that EN.KI is Lord of the Earth who genetically engineered the human race, and p. 109 that ENKI is the god worshipped by the Illuminati and royals.)

Inside the William 2015 Ebook, I found several of these troubling absolutist statements that unnecessarily reject the biblical Messiah in favor of ancient folklore, as if the latter was somehow fully reliable and consistent. Objectively, ancient folklore is not consistent at all. Take for example any comprehensive textbook on ‘comparative religions,’ or just peruse the myriad stories in Voices from Legendary Times, by Ellen Lloyd. But rather than argue that Powers’ can be absolutely disproved by me, I’ll just point out some illogical conclusions I found: for starters, she rejects the prophecies and the gospel by claiming that reptile-blood aliens are calling the shots and deceiving people, and yet somehow these very same reptiles are the ones we should rely on for our history because they would never be able to deceive ancient tablet writers. And on the historical evidence side too, my research shows many folks in the ancient civilizations (such as the tablet writing Sumerians and Ugarites) worshiping just about anything willing to tell them stories if it coincided with them receiving agrarian resources. So they worshipped dead ancestors and various ‘gods’ regardless of which stories conflicted. To read more about the unreliable nature of the

2. The entire book offers only a handful of references inside the text (though there is a brief reading list at the end). The author basically states (albeit eloquently) the same types of conclusions made by Jordan Maxwell.

Authors like Maxwell, Marrs, Powers offer a lot of helpful and interesting data and evidence, but they also pursue the unfortunate modus operandi of drawing unnecessarily absolutist conclusions based on a limited set of historical and astrological evidence and folklore. Often these authors are pointing toward useful typologies (i.e., Venus atmosphere v. Earth atmosphere) and preliminary scientific findings (i.e., known DNA structure) rather than detailed mathematical and physical sources of life on Earth. So, while it's too presumptuous to dismiss their evidence outright, it's also folly to accept their conclusions without further research and calculation. As with virtually all literary-based partial-scientific work, the findings are more likened to '2-D road maps incorporating reference data' than 'multi-layered 3-D topographical maps built on reference data'. In Powers' defense though, she conveys a well-articulated alien-origin theory of history and ties it into the building blocks of life in the end chapters. So the book achieves the useful goal of being thought-provoking and testing your faith. Indeed, it accomplishes this goal very well in the last two chapters especially, which are recommended reading even for skeptics.

Specific Chapters

3. A fairly detailed chapter is devoted to summarizing the 9-11 conspiracy components: the event, engineering questions, media coverage, political goals, military manipulation.

This is well-researched material. It makes for a nice overview of the topic, but readers looking for hard citations should go directly to source materials (i.e., <http://www.ae911truth.org/>).

4. Another chapter is devoted to revisionist history and secrecy through the City States (Vatican, London, D.C.) and the control of America by the English crown and international bankers. These are vital topics discussed in the anti-NWO movement.

This is also well-researched material given the information available. Unfortunately though, the City States is one of the most important topics still missing a rigorous set of books devoted to the evidence. Powers does a fine job though of summarizing the evidence that is out there.

5. In Chapter 4, the author rejects the biblical account of Abraham as barbaric (selling his sister-wife Sarah to the Pharaoh, sacrifice of Isaac, circumcision), and she also rejects the “god” of the old testament. P. 38-40. Relatedly, she claims the Hebrews were the same people as the Egyptians, that the exodus never happened, and that Hebrew Kings like Solomon and David worshipped Egyptian gods. P. 40-44.

Obviously there are many bible passages that are difficult to defend from a moral standpoint, and may very well be the product of bible editing (see, Jeremiah 8:8, “the false stylus of the scribes works falsehood”), or false teaching (see, Jeremiah 32:35 (“...which I neither misvaded them nor ascended it into my heart that they work this abhorrence...”). But also, who can deny that many bible passages seem more palatable if we view ourselves like grapes on a vine, and our father as the farmer. Depending on the season, the farmer finds value in pruning (circumcision?), cutting off certain grapes (sacrifice or killing?), and merchandising the grapes (slavery?). Imagine going into your backyard to tend to your strawberry patch where you find some fruitful strawberries happy with the gift of the garden (of opportunity for good and evil), and yet on the same vine you find atrophied and diseased strawberries calling you an unjust and murderous slave owner. Right or wrong from the perspective of any given berry, the farmer might just smile and laugh and make some dessert with the happy fruit. So the happy fruit gets to pass through the mouth and digestive system of the farmer (and anyone else with whom the farmer shares), but the failed fruit is cast to the ground or compost bin to be mixed with animal feces and feeding microbes. I do though have a hard time wrapping my mind around the morality of a strawberry stoning another strawberry to death for Sabbath breaking. Also, perhaps more telling than Powers’ perspective on the history of Ysrael are her accounts of what the British Monarchy teach about history, as the monarchy is causing such a great deal of killing and hoarding under its ‘holy grail’ claims. You will know a tree by its fruits.

6. Chapter 5 is devoted to the claim that “Jesus” was the same person as the Pharaoh Caesarion, the son of Cleopatra and Julius Caesar. This is a relatively popular claim in YouTube videos. It goes like this... Caesarion was a highly intelligent human who studied at the Library of Alexandria as a youth, so by the age of 12 he was smart enough to teach rabbis, and since the bible is silent on Christ’s whereabouts from age 13-30, then Christ is the same person as “Isa” who learned from the Buddhists how to heal with prayer and other supernatural powers.

In my opinion, the raw idea of Christ traveling to Asia at some point may ultimately have some real merit, but the Cleopatra story is simply in another league. First, it contradicts the messiah prophecies (from prophets who have been accurate in foretelling world events to date). Second, as the ancient text excerpt (provided by Powers) below highlights, the Cleopatra story reads like paperback fiction in the forbidden romance genre, describing a brother and sister affair between Jesus (Caesarion) and Mary Magdalene (Selene):

“On a bright spring morning in 12BC, the opportunity to fulfill her dreams came knocking. A man that Selene did not recognize peered in at her through the lattice of her palace window and startled her. Her husband, Juba, was away in the eastern Mediterranean with their young son, Ptolemy, on a research expedition for a book he was writing. Instead of calling for help from the servants’ quarters, Selene stepped closer to the window to confront the man. ‘His face was like fine gold, his locks bushy and black as a raven. He looked like an Olympic God with eyes like the eyes of doves by the rivers edge, washed with milk, and fitly set. His cheeks were like a bed of spices and fragrant flowers, his lips like lilies dropping sweet smelling myrrh. He was altogether lovely’.... [erotic poem omitted]... In the aftermath of their erotic reunion, Caesarion spoke to Selene of distant lands where he learned the art of healing and the words, the wisdoms and the ways of Buddha, Krishna (Christ-na) and the eastern mystics. He confided in her about his “Divine” plan to defeat Octavian, recapture his father’s Kingdom and reclaim his inheritance as the true and rightful heir to the Roman Empire. He would recapture it not with weapons and armies but by championing a new religion. He would transform the Roman Empire into the Holy Roman Empire and raise a spiritual army that even a hundred Roman armies couldn’t suppress. Caesarion asked Selene to come away with him, to join his spiritual revolution and help him build a new religion.”

There is no way to know who wrote the account above. Chapter 5 then goes on to argue that the crucifixion was staged by Jesus and a handful of insiders to help create a new religion, and that Jesus never died during a crucifixion that only lasted a few hours. On that last point, Powers’ argues the Shroud of Turin supports her claim that Christ survived the crucifixion because, “It is an established medical fact that blood cannot flow from a corpse.” I’m sure Powers means well in trying to marshal forward her theory with scientific backing, but I think she overlooks that even slight pressure can be placed on a wound (i.e., during transportation) to make blood flow out of a corpse. The author then goes on to say that Jesus and Mary Magdalene had a daughter named Sara, with whom they fled to Europe as a family, with Jesus taking the new name Maximinus. Powers makes a general reference to the Gnostic gospel of Mary Magdalene to support her claim. Another claim made in Chapter 5 is that the Gospel of John was also written by Mary Magdalene, who Powers’ argues was Cleopatra’s daughter, named Selene. The remainder of Chapter 5 highlights the bloodbaths of organized religion in the name of Christianity.

Again, a lot of this stuff can be helpful to know if discerned properly, especially about the 'Christian' bloodbaths, but it's the monarchy and self-proclaimed elites who generally believe this Cleopatra folklore and who commission art and perform rituals around these incestuous and secretive ideas. By contrast humble followers of the Messiah are instructed to be cautious and faithful and seek the light. Powers is literally selling the claim that Jesus' goal was to recapture the Holy Roman Empire through secrecy and deception and then marry his sister. Sounds more like an antichrist to whom she is pointing. You will know a tree by its fruits. That means test the fruit (examine the evidence and be logical); no need to ignore it in the name of blind faith. Personally, I see these Cleopatra claims as self-serving theories marshaled forward by murderous and occultist regimes throughout history. Accordingly, it seems that Powers may write a bit hypocritically here, as she is willing to accept secret society folklore as truth, and yet reject secret society actions as evil. Moreover, by focusing only on these kinds of royal genealogies and secret story accounts, she ignores entirely the great mathematical and physical evidence provided in the open light that shows us the hand of our Father: prophecy fulfilled, geomatria, theomatics, earth and temple measurement correlations, coincidences and typologies in our own lives, and so forth. Therefore, I submit that Powers' case is not persuasive. She has failed to disprove the literal-based biblical account of the Messiah.

7. Chapter 6 chronicles the wealth and power of the Monarchy and the Rothschilds, through the connections between Europe, Israel, and America. Special attention is given to the financing of wars for power and ethnic cleansing. Chapters like these show that Powers' real forte as a researcher is in summarizing the breadth of the NWO, and pointing out a handful of examples. She is a very eloquent and interesting writer.

8. Chapter 7 begins with a story that the Knights Templar discovered knowledge and riches under Solomon's temple, where they learned about the false crucifixion and the bloodline of Christ, so they blackmailed the Vatican for power. The author goes to say the Knights Templar were disbanded by the Vatican, but some of them escaped and gained power through secret societies that still exist today. This is basically the same theory that Dan Brown puts forward in his novels. Chapter 7 also chronicles Diana's bloodline, so Powers highlights an extra step that connects the grail dots to William:

"Throughout the ages, the Templars and their connected brotherhoods have operated as unseen hands protecting the Grail bloodline through the vanquishing of ancient civilizations, through the rise and fall of empires, through violent crusades and inquisitions. They have delivered the Grail bloodline right into the modern age and to its intended recipient – Prince William." P. 80

In the 'prophetic timeline' that Powers lays out we begin to see that she may tend to read the bible too selectively, relying only on references to the hand of Lucifer, and not to the hand of the Father. For example, she focuses:

"The Great Tribulation will occur 3½ years into William's reign when he will 'annul' Israel's Peace Treaty and address the world from the new Jewish Temple in Jerusalem. This address will trigger 3½ years of terror during which William will send his forces against Israel and conquer the City of Jerusalem for himself. He will claim the rebuilt Temple of King Solomon as his throne."

Most importantly, Powers assumes that a man must reject the Messiah in order to resist the NWO, lest he becomes apathetic or inadvertently uses the "secret" to marshal in the apocalypse. In her words:

"THE HAPPY ENDING. The happy ending to the story found in the Book of Revelation pacifies, lures and traps the masses into accepting a global take-over by the shadow government. The ending is a children's fairytale about a heroic King (Christ) descending from the sky and throwing the villainous King (Antichrist) into a Lake of Fire and a bottomless pit for a thousand years. After a thousand years, the villainous King (Antichrist) is temporarily resurrected but God destroys both the Antichrist and Satan for all time. God then turns the Earth into an eternal heaven and adorns the city of Jerusalem with precious stones, gates of pearls and streets of solid gold...and everybody lives happily ever after.

"CELEBRATING THE APOCALYPSE. The Bible's End Time prophecies map out an event formula for a global takeover by ten rulers (Kings) under the command of one global ruler. Since Bible believers expect a magical ending to this global hijacking story, they passively welcome every prophetic disaster as a divinely inspired 'next step' towards the second coming of Jesus on a white horse. Christians both dead and alive fully expect to rise up in the air and join Jesus in the sky in what they refer to as 'the Rapture'.

"The question that every sane human being must urgently ask themselves is whether the wrathful hand of God is fulfilling Bible prophecy or the deceptive hands of today's wealthy ruling crime families whose corporations have developed climate, biological and nuclear weaponry to accomplish the task.

"The most insidious part of this global takeover scheme is that these ruling crime families and their church affiliates have conned millions into supporting and even welcoming a horrendous apocalypse that will exhaust and de-populate the masses through deadly viruses, global terror, economic disasters, and nuclear war."

9. Chapters 8 and 9 are devoted to the "10 Sacred Truths" according to Powers. These are interesting and wonderfully eye-opening summaries of

physical and paranormal phenomena, especially for those unfamiliar with this line of research. Among the most prominent themes are the law of attraction, and psychic abilities.

Many of Powers' paragraphs have a useful component but then finish with some unnecessarily absolutist conclusion about physics, such as:

a. "Once this dormant organ [the pineal gland] is awakened through meditation and other techniques, you realize beyond a shadow of a doubt that the world is in you, and not you in the world. You realize that the ocean is in every drop and the universe is in every atom. This enlightenment only occurs when you awaken from the illusion that you are directly perceiving a physical world."

My (Glaser) opinion: I think these types of contrast conclusions are common in Buddhist teaching. "I am nothing. I am everything. We are all one. I am a potato." They usually just help your mind pass the time, or take baby steps toward something useful eventually. In fairness to Powers though, she does explain several mechanics of relative perception. And she really does write skillfully.

b. "Religious propaganda is the "opiate of the masses". Like a drug, it robs people of their personal power by teaching them to worship someone or something outside of themselves. Worshippers are taught passive, dependent, childlike attitudes like, "let God rescue me". By praying to an outside force, worshippers are expressing energy away from themselves. They are affirming that they are not in control, that something beyond them or above them will fix their problems." P. 102.

Glaser opinion: Powers may be correct for a lot of religious behavior, but I think she's throwing the baby out with the bathwater here. Every living thing on earth has a parent. That's a useful example for us, to explain our purpose here. So I wouldn't call all religious behavior the opiate of the masses. For example, is it destructive behavior to trust in a loving parent who is teaching us and testing us? Personally, if I called myself the creator of my own destiny, I'd have to laugh – I usually don't even know which way the wind is blowing.

c. "As people awaken from their hypnosis of separateness and give up their dependency and need for middlemen, they see that the world of energy is everywhere and that "God is energy". They discover that the 'God energy' is not outside of them and it's not an authority over them. It is an energy that is within and around everyone. Worshipping a high and mighty power outside of ourselves separates us from "God energy". P. 102

Glaser opinion: Again, there seems to be a lot of value in Powers' contention, except the last sentence feels overly presumptuous. Incidentally, since the word

“worship” can feel so effacing, let’s use the word ‘honor’ for the moment. Okay, so imagine that you were just born a few minutes ago, and you are being held by your dad inside his house. Do you accept your status as a baby and take some time to get to know your dad and learn from him? Or do you instead say, “Excuse me, caretaker, please take me to the omnipotent creator of the universe at once!”

d. “There really is no such thing as hours or minutes, months or years. Time is a concept invented by the ruling families to enslave the masses in a hurried, regimented and scheduled routine of servitude.” P. 115

Glaser opinion: I think the author was trying to make a point about futility, but got a bit carried away.

10. In particular, I found these statements useful to test my perspective of reality:

i. “You have been taught to believe that you are moving towards events and that the future is ahead of you. Events are actually moving towards you.”

ii. “The world’s ruling families know that the physical world of illusion which you believe to be real is manifested through thought energy. They use their media empires and organized religion to convince billions of Christians that an apocalypse and an Antichrist are coming soon. Their game is all about generating collective opinions, perceptions, beliefs, fears and expectations that will attract and manifest their vision of reality - not yours. Their ultimate goal is not just one world government and one world ruler. IT IS CONTROL OF THE 3RD DIMENSION.”

iii. “Regardless of what you learned in school, modern physics teaches that the essence of creation is NOT matter. According to Biblical scripture, the universe was created from sound. It was created from a Word uttered by God. “In the beginning was the Word and the Word was with God, and the Word was God”. Since God is energy, not a person, the ‘Word’ is energy. Like a song that is created in the mind of a composer before it is performed, the physical realm was created in the mind of Source energy before it became manifest.” P. 108

Glaser opinion: The translation of John 1:1 is open for interpretation. Here’s an Aramaic exegeses:

iv. “Western thinking is shaped by the limitations of logic and language. It teaches you that “thinking” is the highest state of consciousness and it defines you as a physical, finite and mortal being. Eastern philosophy teaches that the highest state of consciousness transcends thinking, language and the logical mind. It is a state of ‘thoughtless awareness’. In thoughtless awareness, you enter the sacred silence which is found in the gap between your thoughts. When you are “in the gap”, you are aware of your surroundings without ‘coloring’ them with judgment. Entering this fourth state of transcendence allows your individual consciousness to join with Source energy. It is a blissful state of pure existence, pure awareness, pure attention and pure being.” P. 114

9. The year 2015 is chosen for the book title because William will be 33 that year, which is the same age she puts the “alleged crucifixion” of Christ. In the entire book, only three passing mentions of the year 2015 are offered: pages 90, 91, and 94. Prophetic study requires far more rigorous chronicling, and I personally think it should be founded on literal-based bible accounts rather than folklore and a birthday. While the latter can indeed be relevant and useful, it doesn’t really make a reliable cornerstone on which to build a theory.

Conclusion

Without trying to label Powers, I’d say we have a lost sheep here who is making very real contributions to intellectualism, and who could really excel by abiding in the word and seeking out the Messiah. Let’s hope for the best.
